01. About the Panel Session

This document outlines the key discussions, questions and themes that emerged from Session Six of Camden's Climate Panel.

The Camden Council Citizens' Panel on Climate met in-person on the 7th of November 2024 at 18.00-20.30, in the Greenwood Centre, Kentish Town. The conversation centred around the recommendations from the Camden Climate Assembly (2019) and looking at which remained relevant for the future Climate Action Plan.

This document captures the Citizen Panel feedback under the three categories of recommendations from the Citizens' Assembly. The recommendations are captured below.

02. Themes relating from the Session

The Panel looked at the three categories of recommendations from the Camden Climate Assembly and considered which of them were:

- 1. Recommendations which are still relevant
- 2. Recommendations which are less relevant
- 3. Recommendations which need amending
- 4. New recommendations which they would make in that theme

Each of the recommendations has an associated number, as listed above. This is why some of the outputs below begin with a number, to indicate which recommendation it was responding to. Where a specific recommendation number is not given it can be inferred which recommendation(s) the comment refers to.

a. The Home

Recommendations which are still relevant

• 1 - Low carbon food - lobby for change of rules for schools as it's super high impact

- health improves, reduces carbon, community growing

- 2 Net-zero homes, carbon reduction, thermal comfort and lower bills
- 3 Green spaces, yes!
- 4 Solar panels on homes

Recommendations which are less relevant

- 5 Make CO2 fun
 - make CO2 communications relatable as comms and engagement is important a tricky thing to do

Recommendations which need amending

- 2 Change the wording from net-zero move to more relatable wording e.g. removing gas, affordability / access, fossil fuel free
- 4 Solar panels what about bungalows and conservation areas?
- Heating decarbonisation / efficiency

New recommendations which you would make

- Exemplary new homes with green roofs etc
- Affordability

- Build resilience of homes heat and flooding
 - Help with solutions and communicate why that is important
- Upskilling in retrofit sector
- Long-term solutions future proofing human costs vs carbon
- Link corporate decarbonisation with retrofit
- Concreting over green space (negative)

Recommendations which are less relevant

Recommendations which need amending

- Allotment statutory issues need to be ironed out so more allotment spaces can be provided
- To protect green spaces
- Community growing spaces promoted
- Maintain current cycle lanes
- Encourage more green roofs, bus shelter, walls
- How to decarbonise heat?
- Communication regarding tree planting
- Make sure all estates [have] community energy schemes
- Data centre to generate energy opportunity
- Develop more community energy options and pilots
- Car free zones striking a balance where does the diverted traffic go?
- More messy female trees

New recommendations which you would make

- Tree planting to include permeable tree pits
- Promote greening front of gardens

- Make walking / public transport / cycling sage
- Resilience shade, colling, cool centres
- School playgrounds open after hours
- Shops and officers? Businesses are in our neighbourhood
- Cycle lanes often flooded need to have proper drainage
